	Postpone the Panic
	"Will Europe fry –or <u>67</u> ? British scientists confirmed last week that global <u>68</u> may be pushing temperatures down, as the <u>69</u> waters of the polar ice <u>70</u> disrupt the ocean currents that keep northern Europe warm. But a closer reading of the <u>71</u> , produced by Britain's National Oceanography Centre, reveals a more <u>72</u> and uncertain picture. Climate researchers see the possibility of a temporary dip in temperatures, but not a sudden catastrophic plunge. The team of <u>73</u> took readings at five points across the Atlantic. <u>74</u> lowered 4,000 meters beneath the surface of the sea provided data on temperature, pressure, currents and salinity. <u>75</u> were then compared with similar readings between 1857 and 2004. The conclusion: the so-called conveyor

belt-which carries $\underline{76}$ ____ water north from the Tropics as part of a giant circulation that begins in the Arctic-has $\underline{77}$ _ by 30% in the last 12 years. There's a $\underline{78}$ ___ that global warming could shut down the conveyor belt altogether. But the possibility of a catastrophic freeze looks $\underline{79}$ _ . says Harry Bryden, who headed the research: " $\underline{80}$ _ the $\underline{81}$ _ stops, we won't see icebergs off the white cliffs of Dover".
